## THE RECEPTION AND TRANSLATION OF PHRASEOLOGICAL UNITS IN POLITICAL SPEECHES. ANALYSIS OF AN *AD HOC* CORPUS (EN, FR > ES)

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### Abstract

This paper<sup>1</sup> examines the most frequent PUs found in political speeches, considering previous studies in phraseology with regard to this specialised language by authors such as Coseriu, 1987; Van Dijk, 1996; Navarro, 2002 or Fuentes *et al.*, 2002. We intend to display from a traductological point of view all the different PUs found in our corpus, composed of English and French political speeches, as well as their corresponding translations into Spanish. Our goal is to classify such PUs in order to obtain quantitative results regarding phraseology in our corpus, and thus attain a broader view of the types of PUs that are commonly used in political speeches and their corresponding percentage frequency. Results will let us bring out a trilingual glossary in our attempt to help other specialists throughout their documentation process when translating.

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## Resumen

El objetivo de este trabajo es investigar las UFS más habituales en los discursos políticos partiendo de las premisas que se han abordado hasta el momento en este lenguaje de especialidad en relación con la fraseología (Coseriu, 1987; Van Dijk, 1996; Navarro, 2002; Fuentes *et al.*, 2002). Adoptando una visión traductológica, mostraremos las UFS halladas en un corpus de trabajo compuesto por discursos políticos en inglés y en francés con su correspondiente traducción hacia el español. La intención es clasificar las UFS para obtener resultados cuantitativos en lo referente a la fraseología del discurso político, tanto en el corpus de discursos en inglés como en el de francés, para así poder obtener una visión más completa de los diferentes tipos de UFS que se hallan en el discurso político y sus porcentajes correspondientes. El resultado de nuestra investigación nos permitirá elaborar un glosario trilingüe cuya finalidad es servir de referencia durante el proceso de documentación de otros especialistas en el tema.

## 1. Phraseology and political discourse: State-of-the-art

Phraseology has been studied from different theoretical perspectives. It is not difficult to find contributions about it from the linguistic (Coseriu, 1987; Corpas Pastor, 1997; Zuluaga, 1997; Martínez Marín, 1996; Navarro, 2002; GarcíaPage Sánchez, 2008), the didactic (García Yelo, 2005; García Romero and Sevilla Muñoz, 2005; Higuera García, 2009; Serrano Lucas, 2010; Brazo Millán, 2018) or the contrastive perspectives (Lozano, 1992; Gutiérrez Díez, 1995; Sevilla Muñoz, 1997; Corpas Pastor, 2003; Radulescu, 2006; Timofeeva, 2012; Mogorrón Huerta, 2014). However, what is of interest for the purposes of this contribution is to know what the state of the art is regarding the various contributions derived from the union between PUs and political discourse.

As the literature on political discourse studies suggests, there is a growing interest in addressing this field on the part of researchers. Most of the literature on the phraseology of political discourse highlights the ability of these units to underline the emphasis on the communicative efficacy of discourse. This is proven by authors such as Van Dijk, 1996; Tannen, 1999; Fernández Lagunilla, 1999; Navarro, 2002; Fabbri *et al.*, 2002; Nuñez

Cabeza et al., 2002; Fuentes et al., 2002; Arce Castillo, 2006; Arellano et al., 2013 or Messina Fajardo, 2016.

If we consider the conclusions reached by the above authors, we could say that the different PUs are embedded in political discourse in order to fulfil different functions. Although they are sometimes assisted by other stylistic and rhetorical resources, such as metaphor, PUs can convey a complete message contextualised in the discourse in which they are inserted. However, PUs found in a political speech do not only appear in this specialised language; one of the most distinctive features of this category lies in the very possibility of being able to be located in different contexts and discourses. This possibility is linked to another distinctive feature of PUs in political discourse: the use of PUs helps the politician engage with the audience, as they often make the message much more accessible, thus fostering the speaker/audience relationship, which, in turn, enhances the appellative function. Hence, the framework of discourse and communication between the political leader and the audience focuses on the argumentative basis on which the discourse is based, favouring the relationship and connection of the ideas conveyed between sender and receiver. As Messina Fajardo (2016: 125) states:

Los políticos recurren a los fraseologismos, o a porciones de refranes disociados de su contexto o trastocados. Las estructuras lingüísticas, al ser memorizadas y al pertenecer a la colectividad son reconocidas por todos sin necesidad de reproducir el texto completo. Esta es una técnica muy empleada también entre los clásicos de la literatura (Cervantes, Rojas, Lope, Quevedo). Con esta técnica, el discurso no solo gana rapidez, eficacia, sino [que] se establece una relación de convivencia y complicidad cultural con el interlocutor.

As a result, we can confirm that the number of functions that PUs represent is enormous. According to Navarro (2002: 202-206), PUs can fulfil up to four different functions: the linguistic-textual function, the phraseological function (citing Zuluaga, 1997: 631), the connotative function and, finally, the iconic function. Thus, it can be proven that PUs serve their own purposes within specialised languages. Although PUs can be studied either as examples of general language use or as specific representations

of specialised languages, it is evident that, as far as political language is concerned, these functions are well delimited, since they basically fulfil the same objectives that are pursued from beginning to end by a political speech: to convince the audience by means of arguments. In this sense, PUs are used in political language as a means to facilitate the understanding of more complex statements and to bring the idea transmitted to the receiver in a closer way. The message is perfectly understood by the receiver of the message, and in the case of the most connotative PUs, the politician is more closely related to his intended argumentative thread in the discourse thanks to the use of contextualised PUs according to diastratic or diatopic qualities, which brings the politician closer to his addressee.

## **2. Phraseological units and expressions and their presence in political speeches**

To briefly summarise the formal classification established by Corpas Pastor (1997: 51) in order to contextualise the state-of-the-art at a glance, we propose the following summary outline. At this point, we must say that, although there has been other subsequent research that details some of the concepts mentioned below and establishes new dichotomies and possible classifications (for example, Sevilla Muñoz and Crida Álvarez, 2013), we will adhere to Corpas Pastor's suggestions as they are the most widely and recurrently used nomenclature by the majority of experts on the subject. In the following summary table, we will also find a classification that alludes to semantic criteria, to which end we have resorted to the contributions of Luque Durán and Manjón Pozas (2002: 2) and Montoro del Arco (2007: 131). Thus, a semantic classification of PUs emerges that makes possible the existence of two subtypes: ontological PUs and cultural PUs. In the case of the ontological ones, they refer to structures and units of universal nature, since they can be extrapolated to other cultures; on the other hand, the cultural ones refer to prototypical features of a particular society or culture, and would be connected to one of the functions mentioned above (specifically, the connotative one, in the terms of Navarro, *op. cit.*). This is

how the authors themselves explain this classification (Luque Durán and Manjón Pozas, *ut supra*):

Como conclusión provisional, puede afirmarse que la tipología fraseológica tendría un esquema de partida en el cual existiría un planteamiento ontológico opuesto a un planteamiento cultural. El planteamiento ontológico postula que una parte de las metáforas no son más que maneras de hablar sobre un determinado fenómeno basándose en asociaciones ontológicas (fisiológicas, etc.) y, por tanto, tendrán un carácter universal. [...] Frente a las metáforas y a la fraseología de planteamiento ontológico existen las metáforas y la fraseología cultural, que se basan en algunas realidades peculiares de un pueblo y de una cultura, como es el caso de los toros en español, el béisbol en el mundo americano, el sumo en japonés, etc., aunque se podían citar centenares de ejemplos. Sin embargo, ontología y cultura son sólo los dos polos en la creación de fraseología metafórica. En realidad, al estudiar la fraseología de diferentes lenguas, encontramos muchos más hechos y problemas que hay que tener en cuenta y dilucidar antes de poder sentar las bases científicas de una tipología fraseológica.

With regard to cultural phraseological units, Montoro del Arco (*ibidem*) explains that “La fraseología de las lenguas es uno de los medios a través de los cuales la memoria colectiva da cuenta de las cualidades y connotaciones socioculturales que se han ido asociando durante siglos [...]”. Therefore, the study of this type of (cultural) units allows us to realise that, in the context of this research, a large extent of the linguistic heritage that emerges among the PUs found in political speeches is a faithful reflection of the culture and of the social and historical collective memory of a linguistic community.

### 3. Objectives and methodology

Our work consisted in compiling a corpus of twenty political speeches in English and another twenty political speeches in French with their respective official translations into Spanish and into English or French (depending on the language of the ST). The texts that integrate the corpus are parallel, which means that in addition to the original version (in English or French, found on the Internet, newspapers, specialised websites [after verification with the original], official translations on the websites of the

Embassy or UNESCO, etc.), the corresponding translated version has also been made available (in digital media, generally on the Internet, on websites specialised in political discourses, etc.). The criterion we followed to select one speech over another by the same leader was the subject of the speech in question, selecting especially institutional political speeches, whether of a national or international nature, since it is in these contexts that a greater frequency of specialised terminology is registered, which also implies a greater frequency of PUs of a political nature. In order to ensure that the samples were similar in terms of size, we used speeches of a similar length, which could be compared to approximately 10-15 minutes in duration in orality, as was found in those speeches for which a televised version was found on the internet channel Youtube. Moreover, only complete speeches were considered, not fragments or news stories.

Having said this, and with the aim of explaining the methodology of the project in which this contribution is framed, we will indicate that the methodology is divided into three stages:

- a. The first phase involved the selection of the PUs found in the English and French texts. Subsequently, information was compiled for each of these units, using the phraseological sheet that will be shown further on in this paper. In this first phase, lexicographic works were used for the creation of the sheet. The objective of this first phase was to compile all the PUs of the source texts in order to search for an equivalent PU taking into account the context in the target language (English/French and Spanish). The results of this first phase have allowed us to elaborate a glossary with our own translation proposals, which will be shown below. This contribution will focus exclusively on this first phase.
- b. A second phase, in which we have checked in the translations of the TTs whether or not the translation (official or in press) offers a formal and semantic equivalence appropriate to convey the same meaning as the PU of the ST. In this vein, we have checked the relevance or inadequacy of the PUs of the TT on the basis of the data in our phraseological sheets and in our glossary. Once all the PUs have

been evaluated, results will also be arranged in percentage terms, and the PUs that have been translated in an alternative way to our proposal will be added to our glossary, provided that they are correctly translated in a context-dependent manner.

- c. The final phase of the project is conceived through a lexicographic tool that will allow us to have the entire glossary together with the phraseological sheets on a website.

In the first of these three phases, which is the one in which this project is framed, we will point out that PUs contained in each speech were first selected, and the translation difficulties associated with the specific context in which each of them was provided were assessed. After an extensive documentation process, suitable translational decisions were sought (linguistically and translational speaking) to represent the reality to which the source PU alluded, respecting, in any case, the basic purpose pursued by the source text. Subsequently, a phraseological sheet was drawn up for each of the PUs in the corpus, which will be exemplified below, taking as a reference the model presented by Serrano Lucas (2010: 202). The content of these sheets is essential for this work, as this information will appear when using the search engine of the website where all these units will appear for consultation, once the project has been completed in its entirety.

The sources used throughout the documentation and translation process in order to proceed with our translation proposals have been the following:

After completing these points, we have prepared a trilingual glossary focusing on political speeches, which will be presented in the following pages with the aim of assisting translators who are confronted with a translational challenge that meets the scope of this work in the documentation tasks concerning this specialised language.

Accordingly, the objectives pursued in this paper are the following:

- To compile a corpus of political speeches in English and French in order to identify all the PUs found throughout the speeches.
- To identify all the PUs found in the English corpus and in the French corpus, in order to quantify the estimated number of PUs per language pair. In order to carry out this identification, we have closely followed the classification criteria of the lexicographical works mentioned above. However, the help of some specific software, such as the Antconc tool, has been of great help in identifying percentages and frequencies of this type of units, with the aim of selecting those whose visibility in the whole corpus was truly representative.

- To study each PU in the specific context of production in the source language and culture in order to understand the meaning acquired in that context.
- To categorise each of the PUs found in the corpus according to the disposition of Corpas Pastor, Luque Durán, Manjón Pozas and Montoro del Arco (op. cit.), following the model of phraseological sheet proposed, in order to know which is the most frequent type of PUs in political speeches for each pair of languages.

#### **4. Translating phraseology: Phraseological units in political speeches in English and French and their reception in Spanish**

##### *4.1. Corpus*

In the preparation of the corpus, we have selected speeches by political leaders from different areas, from the United Nations to the President of the French Republic. In this paper, the variants that we have introduced as search criteria have not been linked to the study of politicians per se, so that the only differentiating pattern has been the language used (and not other criteria such as the ideology of each political speaker, the sex variable, the age variable, etc., which, despite providing much data for our study, should be relegated to future research). Thus, the final compiled corpus stands as follows:

#### 4.2. Sample analysis procedure

After compiling the corpus, the first phase of work consisted in identifying all the PUs found throughout the speeches. Then, each PU had to be contextualized in the communicative act in which it was framed, in order to correctly appreciate the meaning in the source language. Subsequently, the documentation process was carried out to find an equivalent in the target language, and finally, a review process was carried out to check whether or

not the proposed translation met the same expectations of the ST in terms of the purposes of the translation.

In the following lines, we have included a short schematic sample where we will point out the aspects we have referred to above regarding the phases followed to carry out our research. Given the space constraints, it will not be possible to evaluate a sample for each speech in the corpus, nor will it be possible to carry out an extensive analysis of all the PUs in the speeches:

- **Speech data:**
  - **Orator:** Barack H. Obama
  - **Title of the speech:** Cairo Speech
  - **Date:** 2009, 4<sup>th</sup> June
- **Sample:**

(ST) ENGLISH

“But I am convinced that in order to move forward, we must say openly to each other the things we hold in our hearts and that too often are said only behind closed doors. There must be a sustained effort to listen to each other, to learn from each other, to respect one another, and to seek common ground. As the Holy Qur’an tells us, “Be conscious of God and speak always the truth.” That is what I will try to do today, to speak the truth as best I can, humbled by the task before us, and firm in my belief that the interests we share as human beings are far more powerful than the forces that drive us apart”.

- **Analysis:** First of all, a large number of PUs found in the fragment have been identified. As we can see, not all of them belong to the same level, if we look at Corpas Pastor’s summary table (ut supra); thus, we find collocations, such as *move forward*, *human beings* or *drive us apart*, and also parables, such as *Be conscious of God and speak always the truth*, as well as locutions of different kinds, such as *in order to*. After considering the semantic and pragmatic content in which this fragment is inserted, we carried out a phase of semantic comprehension regarding what a PU meant, from the point of view of the illocutionary level. For instance, the expression *Be conscious of God and speak always the truth* would be placed in a

context in which the politician wants to use a parable to illustrate the message he is conveying in that context (to listen to each other, alluding especially to the nations gathered at the summit where he is), so he makes use of this strategically selected PU, since while there are many other PUs of similar meaning, he chooses one that comes from the sacred book for the audience before him (he is in Cairo): The Qur'an. This adds an inferred meaning to the message conveyed. Therefore, from a semantic point of view, we would be dealing with a PU of a cultural nature. This includes a point for the translator: this expression has a coined translation, which already comes from a book that has been translated into many languages. This particular PU has been translated in many versions of the original book by *Tengan conciencia de Dios y digan siempre la verdad* in Spanish, and by *Sois conscients de Dieu et dis toujours la vérité* in French, a translation that corresponds to the most common version of this sacred book for each of these languages, respectively, and which also includes a new PU: *tener conciencia de* and *être conscient de*. In this last example, the French version would be the closest one to the English version in terms of formality, since it respects the structure of the verb *ser* + adjective + *de* (preposition), while in Spanish there is a transposition (in terms of Hurtado, 2000) by means of which the noun of the same lexical family is used as the corresponding adjective: *consciente*. As for the functions carried out by the PU in question, we can say that it fulfils Navarro's functions (ut supra): the phraseological function, insofar as this fragment is full of PUs used to convey the message to the audience; the connotative, insofar as it uses expressions common to the cultural environment of the receiver of the message; and, finally, the iconic, insofar as this passage is a characteristic example of metaphorical language and the poetic function, used to illustrate the argument expressed in the fragment.

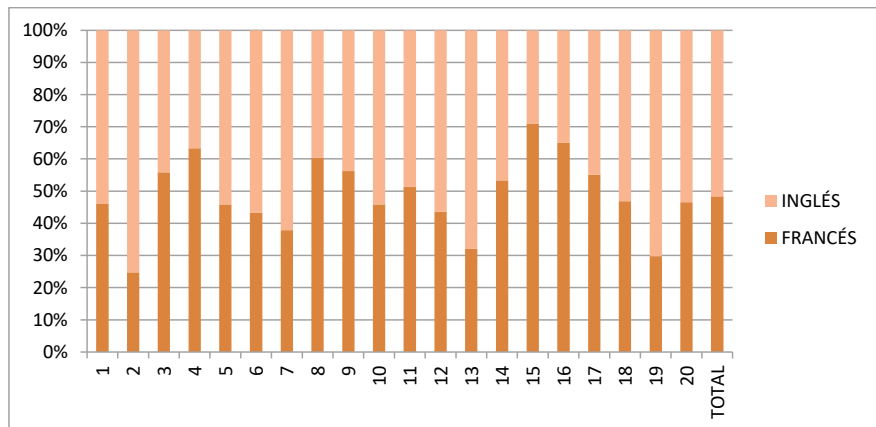


Table 5. Use of PUs for each language (EN, FR)

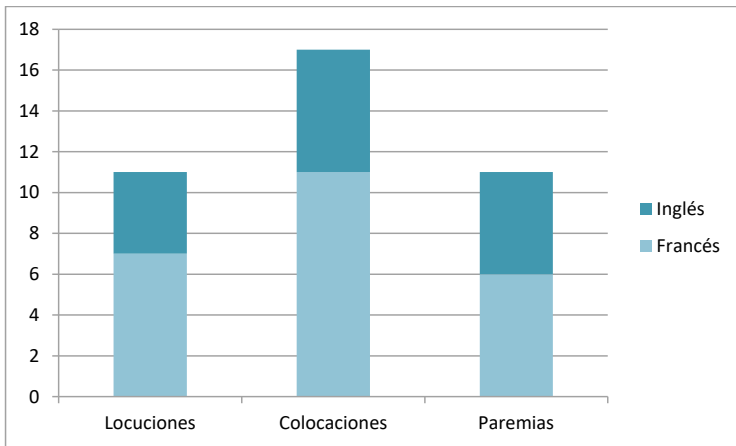


Table 6. Use of phrases, collocations and sayings (EN, FR)

- Percentage relative to the semantic level of PUs: ontological or cultural

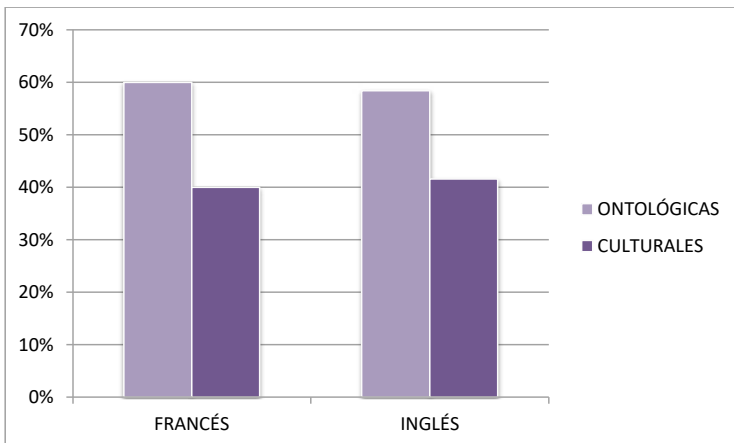


Table 7. Semantic PUs (EN, FR)

#### 4. Proposal for a trilingual glossary of phraseological units found in political speeches (EN, FR, ES)

The analysis carried out in this research has allowed us to carry out a very extensive documentary search, in order to assess the number of PUs resulting from the EN and FR corpus compiled for this work, as well as to proceed with the search for an appropriate translation solution for the corresponding target languages. The use of phraseological sheets has facilitated the analysis of each of the PUs studied, and has simplified the task of documentation for the layout of the final trilingual glossary. Before getting into the subject, we would like to clarify that there are, in many cases, other possible translation options applied to other contexts, but the proposal that we have included on this occasion is adapted, according to our best judgement, to the communicative framework of the source text from which each PU originates. As for the formal classification of these, as can be seen, they closely follow the criteria set out previously by Corpas Pastor (1997), Luque Durán and Manjón Pozas (2002) and Montoro del Arco (2007). This has been the criterion followed to include the PUs that constitute the corpus. In this way, all those paradigms or models of PUs which are conceived as collocations (with collocational models following any of the above-mentioned patterns, such as: verb + nominal phrases (*porter des risques*, for example); verb + prepositional phrase, among others (*to die in vain*); prepositions (for example, *en lo referente a*, whose French equivalent [ST] would be *à l'égard de*, and whose proposed English translation would be *with regard to*); ontological and cultural phraseological units (the House of Commons, for example, is an example of a terminologically inseparable unit, since the reality to which it alludes would be meaningless if either of the two terms that make up this unit were separated. On the other hand, this term is part of a culturally established reality, since it refers to a term specific to the jurisdiction and politics of the United Kingdom, so that the term itself helps to contextualise the source culture, etc.). Once the research has been completed, all the PUs (phraseological sheets and glossary) will be available on a website resulting from the research project we are carrying out, which will provide access to all the formal and semantic information, as well as to the different translation proposals for each of these units. As

we have already justified, due to space constraints it will not be possible to detail every PU incorporated in the corpus, so only those which, according to our best criteria, are of the greatest interest, as well as those with a higher frequency of repetition, have been included.

## 5. Conclusion and future perspectives

As we have seen, the general characteristics of PUs have also been applied to the PUs of political language, specifically in political speeches. According to the results obtained from the corpus analysis, we observe that the language with the highest number of PUs (according to our corpus) is the English language, with a number of 2,418 PUs, compared to the 2,265 found in the French corpus. However, we must consider that these results can only be applied to the representativeness of this corpus, so these data are only approximate and do not attempt to forge a definitive pattern here. Clearly, these results refer to the selected corpus, but we must take into account some other limitations which we must also acknowledge: the length of each speech (it is not easy to locate speeches with the exact same number of words); the context (formal or informal); etc. On the other hand, the language with the highest percentage of PUs in terms of phrases is French (29%), followed again by French for collocations (46%) and, finally, by English with 33% for sayings. As far as ontological and cultural PUs are concerned, we can say that, in general, there is a tendency to use ontological PUs over cultural PUs, with 58.4% in English and 60% in French for ontological PUs, and 41.6% in English and 40% in French for cultural PUs. Broadly speaking, it has been observed that the use of cultural PUs is more common in the case of political speeches delivered in a national context, where the connotative function (Navarro, *ibid.*) is much clearer: the proximity to the audience, the fact that the language and culture are shared, and the formality of the event at which the speech is delivered are, in our view, the fundamental factors for the use of cultural PUs in political speeches. In the case of speeches delivered in international contexts, although cultural PUs also appear regularly, the number is drastically reduced in comparison with speeches delivered in other settings that are much more familiar to the speaker. However, in the light of these results, it would be useful to analyse whether this tendency can be established globally according to the language pair or whether, on the contrary, it is a distinctive use that depends exclusively on the political speaker in question.

At this point, it is worth considering what the next research challenges might be for the future:

- a. To include other variables resulting from this research, such as gender, age, country of origin, place of delivery of the speech, formality of the act in which it is delivered, etc.
- b. To broaden our analysis so as to show the variables taken into account for this study as well as all those we would like to add in the future: the number of PUs used in each political speech in the corpus, the estimated percentage in relation to ontological or cultural PUs for each speech, the functions performed in each speech (connotative, iconic, phraseological), etc.
- c. To study all these variables in political discourse, focusing on the PUs and specifying their use according to each political speaker, in order to determine the patterns that mark the trends when establishing definitive results for each politician in our corpus, and also to consider whether one of the most prototypical features in political discourse has been observed in the translation of the speeches: manipulation.

In short, we believe that this study could contribute to expand existing knowledge in relation to PUs in the field of political language, although there are many variables that have not yet been addressed and which would need, in our view, a greater focus of attention from the point of view of Discourse Studies, a task that will be part of our ongoing research papers. Finally, we are confident that the political glossary resulting from our research will be a good documentary and translational resource for specialists, linguists and translators.
