
INTRODUCTION



METHODOLOGY

- Every ESO (Spanish initials for Compulsory Secondary Education) student is important.
- A warm, welcoming environment
- Detection of learning disorders and use of specific aid schemes
- Learning paces adapted to each student's problems

AIMS

- Extending the right to education to the whole school population
- Reducing the risk of school absenteeism amongst compulsory education students
- Offering school-related support to students whose families, due to different reasons, cannot give their children enough attention when it comes to reinforcing school tasks
- Developing intergenerational solidarity
- Boosting active ageing Promoting an inclusive society by means of education
- Motivated and active senior volunteers
- Regularly providing families with information about the progress made by their children
- Suitable material resources



OUTCOMES

- The programme has satisfied both students and senior volunteers.
- Improved academic results (comparison between the first and the last assessment).
- Families express a high level of satisfaction with the outcome
